



ComEd's Delivery Time-of-Day (TOD) Program

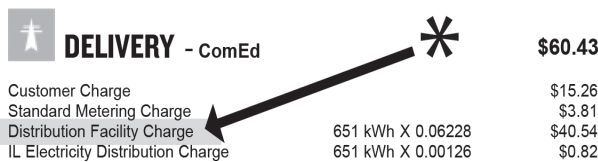

Commonwealth Edison (ComEd) customers now have another choice that can help lower their bills: Delivery Time-of-Day (TOD) Pricing. CUB has advocated for this optional program for years, because it can help customers save money while making our power system more resilient and sustainable.

What is Delivery Time-of-Day Pricing?

As the name indicates, this program impacts the delivery side of the bill—what you pay ComEd to maintain its wires and deliver electricity to your home—plus a profit for the utility. Specifically, under Delivery TOD Pricing you'll pay a different "Distribution Facility Charge."



Most ComEd customers pay a fixed per-kilowatt-hour (kWh) distribution charge that doesn't change over the course of a day. But Delivery TOD customers pay a distribution charge that varies by a set schedule you know in advance.

The TOD schedule divides the day into four periods—with three out of the four periods (18 hours) charging a lower rate than the standard distribution charge. This schedule applies every day, 365 days a year.

Morning (6 a.m. - 1 p.m.): LOWER than standard ComEd distribution rate.

Mid-Day Peak (1 p.m. - 7 p.m.): HIGHER than standard ComEd distribution rate.

Evening (7 p.m. - 9 p.m.): LOWER than standard ComEd distribution rate.

Overnight (9 p.m. - 6 a.m.): LOWEST rate.

The key to saving money in the TOD program is to avoid heavy electricity usage during the one period—the "Mid-Day Peak"—in which the utility charges a significantly higher rate than the standard distribution charge.

How does Delivery Time-of-Day Pricing work?

Exact prices for the Time-of-Day rates differ depending on whether you live in a single-family home or a

home in a multi-family building (3 or more units), and whether or not your home is heated with electricity.

Single-Family (Non-Electric Heat) Distribution Charge Standard: 6.228¢ per kWh

How can I save money in the Delivery (TOD) program?

Time-of-Day prices are lower than ComEd's standard rate for 18 out of 24 hours. You save money by minimizing use of your biggest energy-burning appliances during that six-hour Mid-Day Peak period (1 p.m. - 7 p.m.).

The biggest energy-using appliances may vary from house to house, but the [U.S. Department of Energy has a calculator](#) to help you identify the ones in your home. (Generally, air conditioning, electric space heating, and charging an electric vehicle are big energy hogs.)

What customers are the best candidates for ComEd's Delivery Time-of-Day program?

The best candidates for the Time-of-Day program are households that...

- Can set the thermostat a few degrees higher between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. in the summer.
- Are able to shift use of major appliances (dishwasher, clothes dryer, and washing machine, etc.) to outside the peak hours.
- Are electric heat customers who can set the thermostat a few degrees cooler between 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. during the colder months.
- Are electric vehicle (EV) drivers who can charge overnight, when rates are least expensive. (If you register your EV when enrolling in Time-of-Day, you earn a \$2 a month credit, per EV. The per month credit is limited to two EVs and 24 months.)

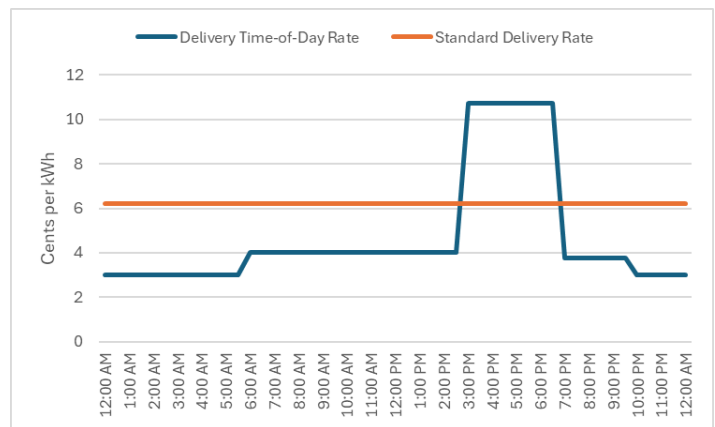
Note: Most customers who are already saving on [Hourly Pricing](#), a ComEd program that charges a supply price that changes hourly, can also save on Delivery Time-of-Day Pricing. Both programs benefit households that can shift their usage to lower-priced times. Read more about Hourly Pricing below.

Are any customers NOT good candidates for TOD?

Warning: Certain solar customers may not be good candidates. Specifically, "legacy" net metering customers who installed their solar systems before 2025 may lose access to a portion of their net metering credits if they participate in the Delivery Time-of-Day program but aren't on a time-variant supply rate, such as Hourly Pricing. To summarize: CUB does not recommend the specific arrangement of combining legacy net metering, Delivery Time-of-Day Pricing, and a fixed supply rate.

You can save money on ComEd's Delivery Time-of-Day program if your household can minimize electricity usage during the "Mid-Day Peak" period.

Other than savings, what are the benefits of Delivery Time-of-Day Pricing?

Time-of-Day is called a dynamic pricing plan—such optional programs are designed to encourage people to use electricity during "off-peak" times, when energy usage and demand are low. That has a number of benefits:

- Reducing electricity usage during peak times reduces demand during those times, and that can lower market supply prices for everyone.
- Lower demand during peak times reduces the stress on the power grid, improving reliability and extending the life of costly-to-replace infrastructure.
- The power plants that only run during peak hours tend to be the dirtiest, so reducing your contribution to peak load reduces pollution.

Does the Delivery Time-of-Day program impact the supply part of electric bills?

No. If you choose Delivery Time of Day Pricing, your supply options don't change. They are:

- The fixed supply rate through ComEd.
- Hourly Pricing, a ComEd program that charges you a supply rate that can change hourly. The least expensive hours for Hourly Pricing, on average, tend to match up with the least-expensive periods for Delivery Time-of-Day pricing. Thus, if you are a household that can shift your electricity usage to off-peak, lower-priced hours, you have the potential to reduce your electric bill through a combination of Hourly Pricing supply rates and Delivery Time-of-Day rates.
